



MEDITERRANEAN CRUISE 1963

USS Kaskaskia (AO-27), named for the Indian River Kaskaskia in Illinois, was first brought into commission as a fleet oiler in the U.S. Navy on 29 October, 1940. As the name on the ship's Bell indicates, she was originally the SS Esso Richmond I, built by the Newport News, Virginia Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company, and launched on September 29, 1939. Principally, Esso Richmond served Gulf ports in four months of merchant service, after which she was sold to the U.S. Maritime Commission for acquisition by the Navy.

Kaskaskia's first year of active service for the Navy was in 1941, during which time the oiler operated be-

tween California and Pearl Harbor, with one trip up across the Gulf of Alaska to Kodiak Island.

After the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Kaskaskia operated almost entirely in the Pacific Theater of operations, often in the forward areas, where she rendezvoused with destroyers, cruisers, carriers and battleships for refueling operations. Kaskaskia remained in the Pacific, (save a brief two month period on the east coast) visiting such ports as New Caledonia, Noumea, Aukland, New Zealand and Tutuila, The Samoan Islands, and Suva Harbor in the Fiji Islands in 1942, to the Marshall Islands in 1944, and into areas of Okinawa, the coast of Japan and Formosa in 1945.




After the surrender of Japan, the ship steamed into Tokyo Bay with the occupation forces, remaining to fuel incoming and outgoing naval units. During the period between April 1946 and June 1953, Kaskaskia made several cruises to the Far East, later taking an active part in the Korean Hostilities, and was awarded such decorations as the Korean Service Medal, with seven battle stars; the Korean Presidential Unit Citation; and the United Nations Service Medal.

Returning to the United States, Kaskaskia was transferred to the Military Sea Transportation Service in April 1955, and decommissioned on 21 October, 1957.

Kaskaskia was reinstated by the Navy on 1 September, 1961, and underwent her reactivation at Brooklyn, Kaskaskia was reinstated by the Navy on 1 September, 1961, and underwent her reactivation at Brooklyn, New York, and at Hoboken, New Jersey, where she was commissioned on 6 December, 1961. Shortly after, in January, 1962, Kaskaskia proceeded to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, for shakedown training. Major operational events for Kaskaskia to date include "Operation Springboard—62", a Naval Exercise in the Caribbean; Project Mercury—Test 66, where Kaskaskia was assigned to a recovery station off the Azores Islands; and an assignment to the northern sections of the Cuban Quarantine in the months of October and November, 1962.

Kaskaskia has recently completed a highly successful spring tour of the Mediterranean Sea, as an operational unit of the Sixth Fleet.



Commanding Officer



CAPTAIN WELLS R. BILL, JR., U.S. NAVY

Captain Wells R. BILL, Jr., U.S. Navy was born in Hartford, Connecticut on July 18, 1916. He was raised in Hartford, Connecticut and Schenectady, New York. Upon graduating from Nott Terrace High School in Schenectady he was appointed to the New York State Maritime College. Following graduation in 1938 he served as deck officer in the U.S. Merchant Marine and was also employed in the marine insurance business.

On 1 August 1941, be was commissioned an Ensign and assigned duty in the office of Chief of Naval Operations. From January 1942 to April 1943 be served in Army Transports as Naval Communications Officer. While aboard USAT MARIPOSA be participated in the invasion of North Africa. In October 1943 Captain BILL was ordered to the Minesweeper USS STRIVE (AM117) where he served as Department Head and Executive Officer until the end of World War II. The STRIVE saw service in the Mediterranean and Pacific theaters including the invasions of Anzio, Southern France and Okinawa. Following his detachment from STRIVE he served as Commanding Officer, USS PEREGRINE (AM-373), Executive Officer, USS HENELY (DD-763) and Commanding Officer, USS HOBSON (DMS-26). During 1946 he was selected for augmentation in the regular Navy. On relinquishing command of HOBSON in 1948 he was assigned to the Navy five-term program at Columbia University in New York which he completed in 1950.

In July 1950 be was ordered to Korea as Chief Staff Officer to Commander Mine Squadron THREE. During the early stages of the Korean conflict be participated in the invasions of INCHON and WOUSAN and the redeployment from HUNGNAM. In addition he was assigned as Task Element Commander in command of mine sweeping forces on the East and West coasts of Korea. For his services in Korea, Captain BILL was awarded the Legion of Merit with Combat V. In September 1951 he was transferred to the Staff of Commander in Chief, North Eastern Atlantic and Mediterranean as Mine Countermeasures Officer until January 1954 when he was ordered to Indian Head, Maryland, as Commanding Officer, U.S. Naval School, Explosive Ordnance Disposal. Following this tour of shore duty in 1957, he was ordered as Commanding Officer, USS HICKOX (DD-763) and USS WADLEIGH (DD-689). While in command of WADLEIGH, he supported the first amphibious landing at Beirut, Lebanon in July 1958.

In June 1959 be reported to Key West, Florida as Executive Officer of the Mine Evaluation Detachment and a short time later as Chief Staff Officer to Commander Key West Test and Evaluation Detachment until July 1961 when he was ordered to Charleston, South Carolina as Chief of Staff to Commander Mine Force, U.S. Atlantic Fleet. Upon completion of his tour of duty in October 1962 he was detailed to his present duty as Commanding Officer of KASKASKIA.

Captain BILL is married to the former Marjorie Monfort White of Poughkeepsie, New York who is living in Charleston, South Carolina with their two children Wells, III, 16, and Barbara, 13.






SONNET "64 ROMBO"



The crew stood laughing at the farce, at last they'd tied the score With that God forsaken birdfarm, and that bothead CARDIV FOUR.










NOTE FROM THE EDITOR:
